**DAWLEY** is a very extensive parish, comprising for civil purposes the townships of **DAWLEY** (or Dawley Magna), **LITTLE DAWLEY** (or Dawley Parva), and **MALINSLEE**, but for ecclesiastical purposes **LITTLE DAWLEY** and **MALINSLEE** are now separate parishes; it is 4 miles south-east from Wellington, about 2½ from Madeley, and 5 from Shifnal, in the Northern division of the county, Wellington division of South Bradford hundred, Madeley union and county court district; rural deanery of Shifnal, archdeaconry of Salop, and diocese of Lichfield: it is situated on the turnpike road leading from Wellington to Bridgnorth. The church of the Holy Trinity is a handsome Gothic building of freestone, erected in 1845: it has a tower with 5 bells, nave, transept, porch, chancel, and contains an organ. The register dates from the year 1666. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £150, with residence, in the gift of Andrew Phillips, esq., and held by the Rev. William Richards, M.A., of Queen's College, Oxford; the Rev. George A. Smallwood is curate in charge. There are two excellent schools for boys and girls, one on the British and one on the National principle. The Pool Hill British schools were erected in 1844 by the Coalbrookdale Company for the children of the workpeople: they comprise a boys', girls', and infants' school, which now contain about 750 children. There are places of worship for Wesleyans, Baptists, New Connexion and Primitive Methodists—in all 14 chapels. A charity of £7 is distributed to the poor on St. Thomas's Day. A new market hall was erected in 1867: it is a commodious square building, with ornamental frontage and vaults underneath; it is surmounted by a turret with bell; a handsome clock was presented for it by Lieut.-Col. William Kenyon-Slaney, lord of the manor. The Coalbrookdale Company carry on extensive coal and iron works in the parish, and give employment to about 2,000 hands. The works at Horsehay are the forges and rolling mills of the Coalbrookdale Company, whose foundries and chief office are at the adjacent hamlet of Coalbrookdale; they were commenced in 1755; but upon the introduction into England, at the close of the last century, of rolling iron, by Mr. Henry Cort, they were very considerably enlarged, and the rolling mill was set up; about 15,000 tons of finished iron, in bars of great variety of sizes and sections, and in plates for shipbuilding or mechanical purposes, are annually made there. The furnaces which produce the necessary quantity of pig iron are situate, two at Dawley Castle and two at Lightmoor. From the surrounding collieries the requisite supplies of coal and ironstone are raised. The Coalbrookdale Company received medals for superiority of manufacture from both the London Exhibition of 1851 and the Paris Exhibition of 1855. Messrs. Leighton & Grenfell have an extensive mill and forge, with mines and collieries in Stirchley parish, the principal office being at Dark-lane. There are a small library, a reading room, and a police station. The gasworks belong to the Dawley Gas Company, and are situated near to Chapel-lane. The market day is every Saturday, for the sale of meat, vegetables, and provisions, and is well attended. A fair is held yearly, on the 4th of June, for horses, cattle, and live stock. Lieut.-Col. William Kenyon-Slaney, who is lord of the manor, and the Coalbrookdale Company are chief landowners in Dawley Magna.

The living is a vicarage, yearly value £150, with residence and half an acre of glebe land, in the gift of the Crown and Bishop alternately, and held by the Rev. James Morris, B.A., of St. Catharine's College, Cambridge. The minerals are coal and ironstone. The Earl of Craven was lord of the manor and

sole landowner; but the property has been divided into sections, and sold. The soil is various; the subsoil is clay. The population in 1861 was 2,451; the area is 900A. 1R. 38P. *Parish Clerk*, Edward Blocksidge.

The church of St. Peter has been restored: it consists of a nave, south aisle, chancel, porch, tower with 4 bells and clock, and contains an organ. The register dates from the year 1553. The living is an endowed vicarage, yearly value about £350, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Hereford, to whom the greater part of the rectorial tithe belongs, and held by the Rev. Philip Edgar Pratt, M.A., of Exeter College, Oxford. A National school for boys and girls is supported by subscription. In the township of Westhope is a chapel of ease, situate about 2½ miles from the mother church. There are charities—viz., the interest of £1,000, given every Sunday in bread to persons not receiving parochial relief; the interest of £100, at Christmas to widows; and a school endowment of about

£9 15s. per annum. Sutton Court is the residence of Mrs. Powell. Col. Clinton is lord of the manors of Diddlebury and Peaton, and T. L. Roberts, esq., of that of Corfton. The principal landowners are Thomas Lloyd Roberts, esq., Mrs. Powell, Col. Clinton, Miss Mytton, Major Dyer, R.A., Mrs. Vickers, H. Cornwall, esq., Hugh Johnston, esq., and James Beddoes, esq. The soil on the west side of the Corve is good turnip land, on the east bank a stiff clay; subsoil, sandstone and clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats, barley and turnips. The area of the parish is 9,535 acres, and the population in 1861 was 829; gross estimated rental, £10,830; rateable value, £9,245.

THE SKIRMAZE, formerly extra-parochial, is now a parish in Ludlow union, and contained in 1861 a population of 4: it contains only one labourer's cottage.
